



Mission Statement:

Making the world a better place in which to live by providing and administering humanitarian funding to an ever growing worldwide network of private non-profit organizations, helping them achieve success at rendering the greatest possible benefits to those they are dedicated to assisting.

The Serendipity International Foundation is the result of over 19 years of humanitarian effort by Mr. Harley Phillips helping children and villages in Ghana, West Africa. Using his own money and resources, he helped repair water systems, started a clinic, repaired school roofs and provided books and paper. He even sold African art, gold and diamonds for friends to send funds back to villages in Ghana. Because of his years of effort on behalf of people and children in Ghana, in 1997 Mr. Phillips was given the rare honor of being installed as a Chief of the Anlo tribe in the Volta region of Ghana. Thus, Mr. Harley Phillips, a 70-year old California senior citizen, became Torgbi Dunenyo I of Tsiame.

Since 2001, Serendipity has worked with various representatives of U.S. and world governmental bodies to solve a long-standing problem in humanitarian funding. Many government agencies and large charities give away billions of dollars each year to projects purported to help children, families, homeless, seniors and the disadvantaged yet only a small percentage of the aid given ever actually gets to those who need it most. An enormous amount of donated funds and articles end up going to intermediaries, representatives, assistants and especially upper management, usually in the form of high salaries and benefits.

The Serendipity International Foundation has been tasked with solving the problem by building a worldwide network of private, dedicated non-profit and charitable groups for specific humanitarian projects. By building this network based on traditional business models, maintaining accountability, and by tightly controlling administration of funds, the foundation is able to track funding to successful implementation. Special Program Managers are assigned to one or more projects to monitor progress, track funds use, audit operations and to assist in every way to insure success in meeting or surpassing the project objectives.

We are part of a team of three foundations, each of which has a role providing the maximum assistance to those in need through efficient use of funds. The Canadian Millennium Allocations Collective (CMAC) foundation in Burlington, Ontario, Canada, provides direct project approval and administrative access to Canadian and other worldwide projects. The Human Resources Development, Inc. (HRDI) foundation in Florida provides access and authority for international funding sources through the United Nations Association of the United States. Serendipity is the primary financial arm of the three foundations and is responsible for approving projects, managing funding and administering funds to approved projects worldwide. We also insure that a minimum of 85% to 95% (or more) of all funds administered by Serendipity are used directly for humanitarian needs.

The better an organization is at achieving their goals of helping their target group, the more funding and assistance can be made available to them for expansion of their efforts. Everything done promotes efficient and businesslike performance, efforts and accountability from all involved at every step along the way so that the primary goal for everyone is the greatest amount of success possible.
