

Afri-Cure Project

Overview

Viral infections such as ebola, influenza, AIDS, herpes, rhinovirus and hepatitis kill and incapacitate people worldwide every day. The Serendipity International Foundation has discovered a potential cure for many viruses that was developed by a US company. The product has been tested by the National Institutes for Health and was found to be effective in eliminating many of these viruses.

Because of the high cost of testing and approval in the US, the foundation was asked to assist in completing testing of the product. Our experience in Africa provides an excellent opportunity to both complete human testing and, at the same time, provide help to many sufferers of many diseases.

The overall plan is to provide the treatment to up to 20,000 people in Africa who have viral diseases, especially those with HIV/AIDS. Instead of typical western tests where half of the subjects are provided with a placebo that does no good whatsoever, the planned tests will simply document results gained with every patient provided the product. In this way, we can potentially help everyone tested while finding out how the treatment works with different diseases.

The treatment product itself is developed from naturally occurring compounds and exhaustive US-based testing by the National Institutes of Health has proven it to have absolutely no toxicity or side effects. Therefore, with a product potentially able to rid the body of deadly viruses while having no toxic side effects at all, many people in Africa are more than willing to try it.

The Testing Plan

The foundation has been granted unlimited access to the pill form of the product for a price of only 20 cents per tablet. The estimated dose to eliminate most viruses from the body is approximately 200 to 500 tablets over the course of 90 days. In the case of invasive viruses, the patient may have to take a maintenance dose for several years or more. Overall this is an extremely low cost for viral treatment.

The year of tests will be conducted through voluntary counseling and testing (VCT) sites and medical facilities initially in Ghana followed by Tanzania, South Africa, Zambia and then other countries to be selected. The patients will not be paid any fee nor will they be charged a fee for participation. The interest of the foundation is to prove effectiveness, confirm dosage and to document all results for statistical analysis. The results will then be used in the US to convince the medical establishment of the product efficacy and safety for sale and use in this country.

The manufacturer of the product has agreed that the foundation will purchase ten million tablets at 20 cents each with long term guarantee of that price. This guarantee will be in return for conducting and documenting the live testing. Initially 500 patients will be selected for specific viral diseases followed by open selection of new patients with any viral malady. Over the course of the year test period we anticipate treating a minimum of 20,000 people which should provide a good statistical population.

Although an average treatment time frame of 90 days per patient is assumed, in reality it is expected that most patients will require very short stays in the hospital or clinic and that most treatment will actually be done on an outpatient basis.

Organization

The foundation will organize a headquarters office in California for the project duration. Through three coordinating offices in Africa, test results, inquiries and assistance will be provided through a private Internet web site in San Antonio, Texas on private servers for long term security and storage. Each country will be provided the treatment at cost and will utilize their own doctors and clinics. We have budgeted for travel as needed to coordinate the offices, the tests and the results as may be necessary. However, for the most part, the local clinics and medical personnel will administer the treatment according to our plans, document the results and communicate with us via the Internet and telephone.

Ghana currently estimates there are over 500,000 citizens with HIV who are unaware of it. Working with the National AIDS Control Program in Ghana, initial tests will be directed through the VCTs, Voluntary Counseling and Testing centers. Other test locations in Africa will be clinics, hospitals and outpatient facilities for long term follow up and treatment continuation.

The test process, progress and results will not be made available to the press until conclusions have been reached and documentation confirmed through other agencies.

Costs

The overall cost for the one-year test is \$5 million. This total includes cost of treatment, facilities, travel and operation allowing for a 6% reserve and an overhead cost of 13%. Once underway, additional efforts at long term fund raising will commence to continue treatment for others throughout Africa and worldwide in the future.

Assumptions for the cost analysis include budgeting an average of 500 tablets per patient, testing kits and a small staff for coordination as well as for additional potential costs for facility use, bedding and supplies for patients.

Conclusion

The Afri-Cure project is an opportunity to help people worldwide by taking advantage of a need to confirm effectiveness of a new treatment for viral illnesses. The opportunity is that the foundation can help prove the product by treating many people who otherwise would get no assistance. The product is proven safe and non-toxic in tests conducted by the renowned National Institutes for Health and thus, there are many people in Africa who are willing to participate in the program. Another benefit from this effort will be the large amount of documented proof of effectiveness and non-toxicity that will help force the US based medical establishment to allow treatment of Americans with viral diseases without continued delays or requiring years of additional testing.
